Join Wesbury as we tour the scenic Hudson River Valley in Eastern New York State. Made up of a consortium of communities located on the banks of New York's majestic Hudson River, the Hudson Valley is a getaway destination offering spectacular mountain views as well as stunning, historic estates. We will be leaving Meadville on Monday, June 4th and returning Friday, June 8th via Anderson Motor Coach for a 5-day, 4-night tour of many of the Hudson Valley's notable sites including: The U.S. Military Academy at West Point, the Culinary Institute of America at Hyde Park, FDR Center at Val-Kill, Rockefeller Estate "Kykuit", Phillipsburg Manor, Vanderbilt Mansion National Historic Site and Olana, built by Hudson River School painter Frederic Church. Olana is one of the few intact artists' home, studio and estate-complexes in the United States.

We will visit historic villages like Sleepy Hollow, made famous by author Washington Irving's tale of Ichabod Crane and his legendary encounter with the Headless Horseman. At Sleepy Hollow visitors can also see the historic 1883 Lighthouse and the Tappan Zee Bridge. A stop at Tarrytown offers the perfect blend of history and nature featuring districts showcasing 19th and 20th century architecture and the romantic landscapes of Washington Irving's home, Sunnyside, designed by Irving himself.

The cost for this trip starts at \$1024 per person, based on double occupancy. The price includes transportation, 4 nights lodging, admission to 10 attractions and 11 meals which include 4 breakfasts, 3 lunches and 4 dinners. A small portion of the cost of the trip is a donation to the Wesbury Foundation's Benevolent Care Fund. \$100 is due at booking and the final payment is due in April. Some Good News About The Housing Market

Although we commonly hear negative stories about the housing market, it is important to be aware that most of these stories come from other parts of the country. No one can dispute that the housing market has experienced challenges across the nation, but we can show that Crawford County and the surrounding region are not suffering to the same extent. In this area the housing market has a tendency to remain stable. Because the region did not see the increase in home values that occurred some years back, we are not experiencing the same drop in values either.

The Greater Meadville Board of Realtors® collects annual data that reveals that the average home sold for \$116,134 within 6.7 months in 2011. There was a slight increase in the percentage of homes sold from 2010 to 2011 showing a slow but steady improvement in the market. Of homes shown in the Meadville area Multi Listing System, 544 properties sold this past year. Good news, properties are selling.

Each year a small number of villas or apartments become available at Wesbury's Thoburn Village drawing the interest of those seeking a maintenance-free retirement lifestyle. Most new residents sold their homes within six months or less; some within a month. There are many factors that play into what sells quickly, such as location, price, size and amenities. The lesson here is that there is a buyer for every situation and at all times of year. Recently, we spoke to a couple who has been house-hunting since last spring. They expected to have a plethora of choices and lots of time



to look before making an offer. They were shocked to learn that most of the houses that they looked at sold quickly and near the listing price.

Sharing Our Mission

Wesbury's Sunset Auxiliary was founded in 1954 by Mrs. Florence Braun to create a network of individuals within the Western Conference of the United Methodist Church to make friends and raise funds for the residents at Wesbury. Each year through annual membership drives within the local churches and by holding special fundraising events such as the Chicken BBQ and Craft Fair and Christmas Bazaar, the Sunset Auxiliary donates items to Wesbury that can be used for the betterment of residents.

sion to Grace Health Center. The Sunset Auxiliary also provided funds to The Clubhouse at Thoburn Village to purchase items that are needed to enhance resident activities. Residents at Wesbury are extremely grateful to the Sunset Auxiliary and the network of churches who have lent their support with many necessities over the years.

Many residents throughout the Wesbury community receive philanthropic support in one form or another. More than 60% of the residents at Wesbury's Grace Health Center, 20% of the residents at Cribbs Residential Center, 33% of the residents at Wesbury-Hillside Home and several Thoburn Village residents receive subsidized care. Wesbury's Benevolent Care Fund helps ensure that Wesbury has never had to ask anyone to leave, regardless of their ability to pay for care.

Wesbury White Dove Award recipients Reverend Robert Bickerstaff and his wife, Sally, of Brookville, PA., experienced the support of Wesbury's Benevolent Care firsthand with Bob's mother, Hazel. Hazel Bickerstaff moved to

Wesbury's Cribb Residential Center in 1999 with a sufficient amount of money to live for a number of years. As Hazel's health went into decline she moved to Grace Health Center with enough funds to cover the cost of her care, but the funds depleted rapidly. With her resources almost spent, the family sought the help of Webury's financial advisors and the Commonwealth's Medicare office. Hazel began to pay for care with the help of Wesbury's Benevolent Care Fund. The Bickerstaffs proudly say that they saw no change in care when Hazel went from private pay to Benevolent Care and Medicaid. They credit this as an indication of Wesbury's commitment to the quality of care for all residents at Wesbury. They also consider it a high point of their relationship with Wesbury; a relationship that continues to this day as the Bickerstaffs believe it is a responsibility to "pay it forward" for future residents by giving to the Benevolent Care Fund and through Sally's service on the Wesbury Sunset Auxiliary Board.

Award Winning Wound Care

Often new residents arrive with a need for specialized skin care. In order to streamline the protocol to care for different skin conditions, Wesbury assigned a nurse to be responsible for all of the residents' skin health needs in 2004. It soon became clear that one person could not do this alone, and the "Wound Team" was created. In order to produce the best outcomes, the Wound Team manager became Wound Care Certified by the National Alliance of Wound Care, and Doppler laser scanning equipment was purchased to better check circulation in lower extremities. Wounds are usually compounded by poor circulation from either diabetes, arterial or venous involvement. In wound care they say "the closer to the heart, the easier to heal", making feet the most challenging. Foot structure changes throughout our lives and proper foot care cannot be underestimated. To ensure optimal resident health and proactive care, the Wound Team coordinates and assists visits from a local podiatrist who comes to Wesbury every Friday.

Prior to 2004 there was a reactive approach to treating skin wounds. Today, as a proactive measure, the

Wound Team ensures every resident is checked for skin concerns upon admission to Grace Health Center. Needs such as pressure ulcer treatment and prevention can be challenging to deal with yet through improved treatment techniques, education and equipment the Wound Team is up to the challenges. Current data shows that Wesbury's acquired pressure ulcer rate is 0.5% – the best it has ever been. The Team and the supporting staff involved strive to meet the goal of zero pressure ulcers, starting with basic skin care and working through to more complex areas.

The Wound Team was recognized nationally in 2006 with a Cherokee Inspired Comfort Award. They also presented their program protocols

at the 2007 American Medical Directors Association Conference in Miami, Florida and were published for best practices in the DermaSaver case study collection.

Wesbury's Wound Team has been privileged to coordinate care with several hospitals and Wound Centers from Erie to Pittsburgh and the Cleveland Clinic. People travel to these areas for health care, but they want to come home to heal. That is where Wesbury can help by ensuring the best care and most upto-date practices are available. If you or a loved requires these specialties, Wesbury can meet the need whether it is for preventative care, a rehabilitative stay or long term care.
