

Childhood Neighbors Reunited at Wesbury

Three childhood friends, who have not seen each other in over 60 years, recently reunited at Wesbury.

Glenn Rodgers made the move to Wesbury's Thoburn Village nine years ago. A retired pharmacist from Titusville, PA., Glenn grew up in nearby Oil City graduating from Oil City High School in 1945. Glenn is a staple of the Wesbury community, because he is involved in many different activities both on campus and off, it is no surprise when someone new to Thoburn Village approaches Glenn and introduces themselves.

At a dinner in 2007 when a new resident to the community came over to introduce herself things felt normal until she asked, "Do you recognize me?"

Glenn looked at her and thought to himself he had no idea who she was. She then said, "You used to sing under my window." Glenn is a Barbershopper, so singing anywhere is not a stretch, but under her window? Nope, still no clue. "I am Lois Redmond - now Green."

He was shocked. Lois was his next door neighbor growing up in Oil City. Glenn and Lois went to elementary school together at Hasson Heights School. After school Lois married and worked as bookkeeper for her husband's tool shop in Franklin, PA. for 40 years. The Greens made the decision to move to Thoburn Village after attending the Annual Chicken

BBQ and feeling that Wesbury is the place they should be for security in their senior years. Upon moving in and looking over the Thoburn Village telephone directory, she noticed Glenn's name and wondered if it could be the same person. After all, she had not seen him in over 60 years.

Another classmate, Shirley (Phillips) McHugh lived across the street from Lois and Glenn during their childhood. After graduating from Oil City High School in 1946 Shirley made a trip out west, settling in Long Beach, California. While there, Shirley obtained her Class A Driver's License and drove a semi-tractor trailer truck coast to coast with her husband for over 20 years. After a high school reunion, Lois obtained Shirley's contact information and they began to correspond with letters. When Shirley mentioned she was interested

in coming back to the area but needed some care Lois suggested she come to Wesbury's Grace Health Center.

Two weeks after Shirley's arrival at Grace, the three friends sat down together to reminisce of the time they spent together in elementary school, the people in their neighborhood and what they have been doing over the past 65 years. They laughed like any old friends would. Lois summed it up best when she beamed "Wesbury brought us all together".

Volunteering at Wesbury



In July 2010, Theresa Colantonio began a 16 week short term rehabilitative stay at Wesbury's Grace Health Center after fracturing her heel. While she thought to herself this was quite a predicament to be in, she wanted to make the best of the experience. She began attending Grace Resident Council meetings and formed relationships with other residents and staff alike.

Theresa moved to the Meadville area in 2004 to be close to her grandchildren after her son took a position at the Meadville Medical Center. She had lived in Brooklyn, NY her entire life and her personality certainly shows it as she is very outgoing, friendly and not afraid

to say what is on her mind. By the time she was released from Grace in October, Theresa had a hand in making recommendations for the short term rehabilitation accommodations as well as educating other residents about available meal options. Theresa describes her stay at Grace as nothing short of marvelous and decided as long as her health permits, she wants to come back to Wesbury and give her time to the residents at Grace. Theresa rides the bus 3 days a week to Wesbury where she may spend as many as 6 hours at a time playing games or just connecting with the residents. She even went to the Crawford County Fair as a companion, commenting that the

resident she was accompanying wanted to see all the animals so they went to all the barns. "The trip cost me \$59 dollars," Teresa adds, "I had to throw away the sneakers I was wearing because they got so dirty at the fairgrounds, no problem though, we had a great time." She also loves stopping by Wesbury's Farmer's Market when she is leaving for the day. "Where else can you get 3 peppers for a dollar?" she quips.

Volunteering is very important to Theresa, as she also gives of her time to Meadville's Active Aging. Theresa says, "It's important to try to get people going and build trust as well as make people happy." Wesbury is grateful to have the support of Theresa and many other people in the community who donate their time and talents to the residents at Wesbury by transporting residents to therapy, marking resident's clothing, working in the Sunset Auxiliary Gift Shoppe, assisting with activities or just sitting and listening for a while; it is all appreciated.

Walking for Better Health

When Margaret Walker moved to Wesbury's Thoburn Village three years ago, her new neighbors had no idea they had a U.S. record breaking athlete in their midst. Margaret has always liked to walk for exercise. After retiring from Edinboro University where she worked as a dietician Margaret approached the Edinboro Athletic Department about training for "Race Walking".

"Race Walking" is a long-distance athletic event. Although it is a foot race, it is different from running in that one foot must appear to be in contact with the ground at all times. Stride length is reduced, to achieve competitive speeds, race walkers must attain cadence rates comparable to those achieved by Olympic 400-meter runners. Margaret trained for two years with a walking club, then joined the World Association of Veteran Athletes and competed nationally through a registered walking club in Pennsylvania. Competitions were

held all over the country including Texas, Nevada and Florida. In all those competitions she medaled in each event coming in third place only once, the rest were first and second place. At an international track and field event in Buffalo, Margaret took home a silver medal in the 10K race and took home a gold medal in the 5K race breaking the U.S. record!

Although Margaret no longer competes in the race walking events she still makes the time to get out with her grandchildren and great-grandchildren in the Erie Runner's Club's Turkey Trot, which is held each year at Presque Isle and brings in over 2,000 walkers over Thanksgiving weekend.

Margaret stays active in a number of ways at Wesbury. She can be found at the Clubhouse at Thoburn Village on any given day socializing, taking an exercise class and working on jigsaw puzzles. Margaret also participates in the Wesbury Walk Now! Program. Since its inception in May the participants of the Wesbury Walk Now! program have logged in 2,050 miles, including Margaret's 83 miles.

Like Margaret, over 40% of the entire populous of Thoburn Village is enrolled in some kind of fitness program including Body Recall, tai chi and yoga. The great thing about these programs is that the personal outcomes are based on real results that lead to a stronger, more flexible and healthier individual.

home but require assistance with daily tasks.
